

# Kufs Split Weekend Tilts With Avon, Calkins Cagers

A great second half rally Sunday night fell short and Kufs News had to settle for a split over the weekend.

Saturday night the newsmen journeyed to Avon where they powered their way to a 106-88 win over the home team. They were paced by the shooting of Bob Gumaer, who tallied 38 points. He set a club record by sinking 17 of his 18 field goals.

Although double teamed most of the night, he still managed to shake loose, again and again for driving layups or quick jump shots.

Gumaer was given plenty of help by John Miller with 17, John Daum 16, Tom Schmidt 14, and Tom Quinn 10.

Quinn blocked at least 9 shots and dominated both backboards before fouling out. Miller and Daum were also very strong in the rebounding effort.

At ACC Sunday night the News men dropped a 106-103 verdict to a hot shooting Calkins Motors team from Troy, Pa.

Coach Ormie Kings cagers fell behind by as many as 23 points in the first half and seemed hopelessly out of it as Calkins took a 62-44 lead into intermission.

Calkins had some great shooting in the first 2 quarters by Tom Griscavage and Bob Felt. They hit consistently from outside and led a strong Troy fast break.

The only highlight for the locals in the 1st half was the defensive work of Billy Huther on Dukes big gun of last year—Denny Ferguson. Huther held the Southern Conference star scoreless through two stanzas. Huther had 14 himself before injuring his elbow early in the

3rd. quarter. The 14 points Huther had was 8 more than All American Gail Goodrich had off Ferguson in the Duke-UCLA game last year.

In the second half the newsmen kept chopping away at the Troy lead until with a minute and a half left the score was 99 to 98. Another ex-Duke player—Herc Lamby sank two free throws and Dave Russell one, but Don Poole cut the margin to two points with a long flip from the corner. Poole and Lamby each made a free throw before Ferguson threw in a 15 footer and then sank a charity toss. A bucket by Jim Gohacki cut the margin to 3 points before time ran out.

Gumaer again led Kufs with 29, followed by Gohacki, Daum, Huther and Poole with 17, 15, 14 and 13 respectively.

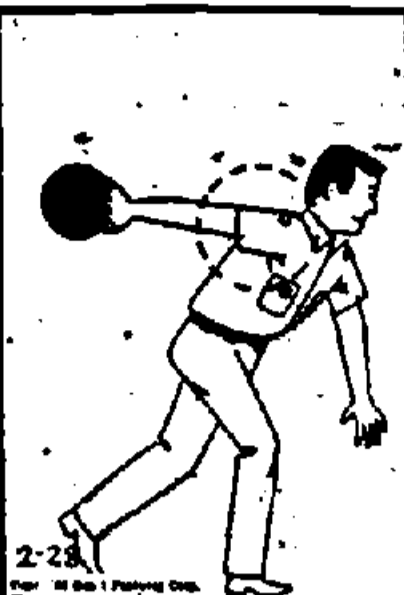
Kufs travels to Troy, March 10 in an attempt to even the series.

# Tenpin Tips '700' Club Holds Member Tourney



I had myself sideways at the foul line. What causes this?

Whenever a bowler does not finish with both shoulders parallel to the foul line and when his sliding knee and his sliding foot are not perpendicular with foul line, his chances of hitting target are greatly reduced. Coming in sideways is generally caused by a faulty pendulum swing. When the bowler, in bringing the ball into the backswing, makes his right shoulder (right hand) come back, it causes both shoulders to be at right angle to foul line on his next swing to last step resulting in a sideways finish. Remedy: shorten backswing, keeping pendulum in line with target.

# Braves Antitrust Suit Opens Today

MILWAUKEE (AP) — The trial of Wisconsin's antitrust suit against the Braves and the National League begins today, opening the climactic phase of Milwaukee's fight to stay alive as a major league city and threatening the very structure of baseball.

Lawyers in the Milwaukee County Circuit Court case are not hazarding guesses on when the trial will end. They say it will take at least one week and possibly could drag on through March.

The trial's duration will depend on how much each side tries to elaborate on the case it has already built in weeks of pretrial legal sparring.

National League owners and officials as well as Milwaukee and Wisconsin civic and political leaders already have been examined and cross-examined in a series of questioning sessions held as a trial prelude.

The questions and answers from those sessions are expected to be made part of the trial record.

Wisconsin lawyers are hoping for a speedy trial and a judgment ordering the National League to give Milwaukee baseball. They would prefer that the ruling come before the Braves

open the season in their new Atlanta home April 12.

Baseball fought hard to get the case put off until at least June or July, but succeeded only in getting the trial pushed back from its original Feb. 1 starting date.

In the way of any Wisconsin court order is a federal injunction handed down by U.S. District Judge James Noel in Houston, Tex., last Thursday. He ordered the Braves to meet their commitments in Atlanta and the National League to abide by the schedule already drawn.

Wisconsin is maintaining that organized baseball is a monopoly, with complete and illegal control over where baseball is played and who pays it.

The monopolistic structure of baseball allows it to abandon Milwaukee as a major league city, the state is contending, while keeping the city from going anywhere else for a replacement franchise.

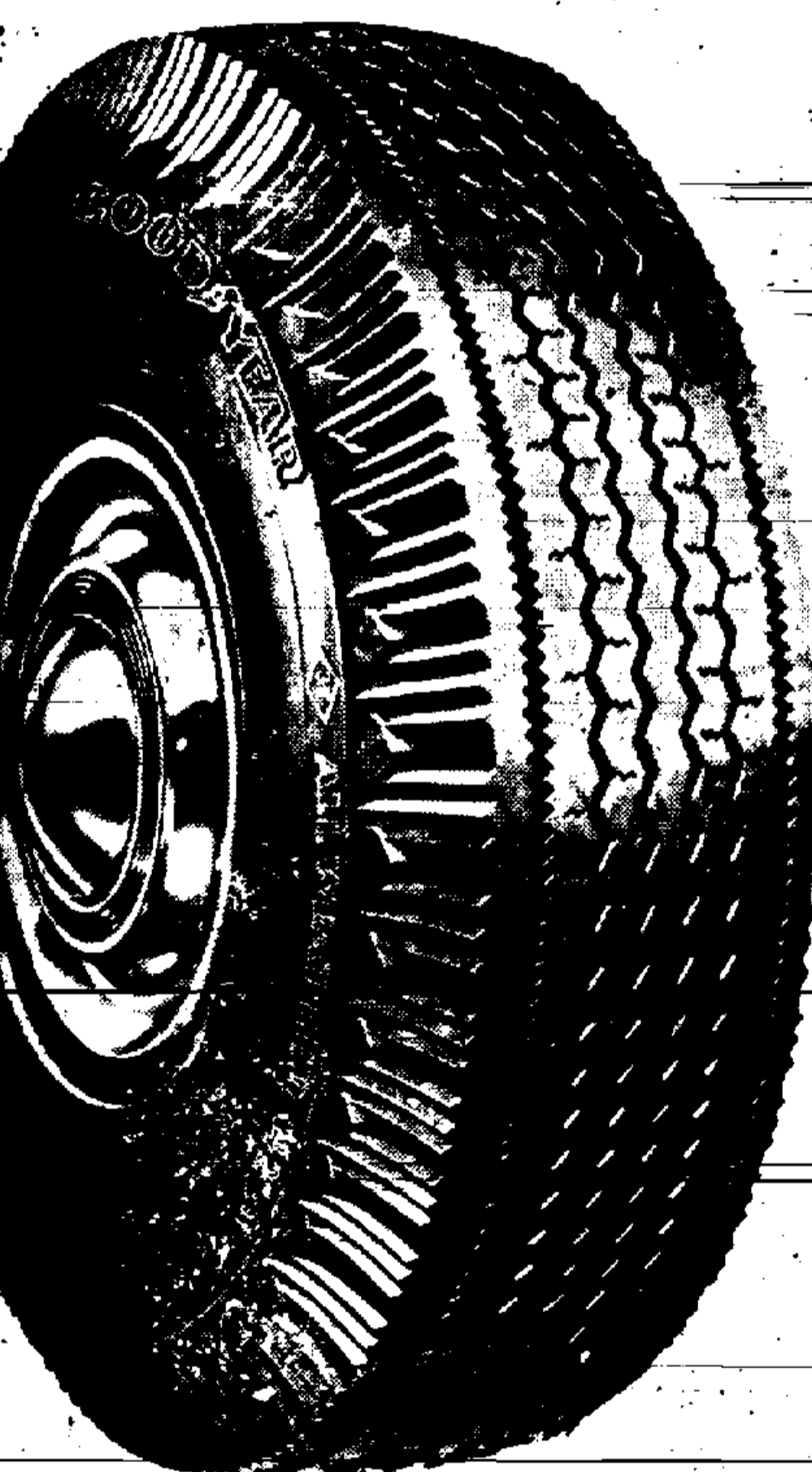
