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Crime does not follow a timetable or a calendar," Mr. Stanton commented. All police personnel must be on a seven day, 24-hour call. If a policeman plans to leave town, he must report to the station.

Also more trouble and crimes happen when the rush hours begin, he added. This means there must be more personnel employed at that time than at any other time of the day. This is very difficult with a small police force.

Auburn Community College offers a few courses for police officers. The Auburn Police Department does not make mandatory for any policeman to take the courses, but it does recommend them as an aid in furthering a police career, Mr. Stanton said.

In reviewing Chief Stanton's remarks, this reporter concluded that "to be an Auburn police officer or not to be" is a good question. But now with the excellent benefits offered to a new policeman, it is very hard to turn down.

The work is not tough, but to be on call for 24 hours with no reimbursement is a hard choice. Everyone could practice law enforcement by keeping alert and staying out of trouble.
