Sennett riders explore world of Percherons

The Sennett Saddle Club went back some 50 years Feb. 19 when they visited the Ernest Luke farm, Clinton Road, Weedsport. The farm has modern conveniences, but four Percheron horses are still used every day for farm labor.

Luke itemized parts of the harnessing procedure and demonstrated how pieces fit together to enable horses to pull a sleigh or farm wagon.

Percherons were brought to this country from Perche, France in 1839. They are gray or black and are usually used for farm work or in circuses.

Besides the Percherons, Luke also harnessed two dapple-gray ponies to a small red sleigh which his son Arthur drove. Mrs. Jan Campbell, of Owasco helped with the harnessing.

The younger children jumped on to the smaller sleigh while the older ones waited to ride in the big bobeleigh which "Jim" and "Daisy", six-year old Percherons, pulled.

Leaders said they could remember going to school in a sleigh such as Luke's and one commented "you never had to worry about getting them started."

Luke is an experienced farrier or blacksmith and shoes his own horses.

Navy opens 40 schools to women

According to Dick Kinzig and Bill Tretheway, local Navy representatives, the Navy has made guaranteed schooling in over 40 specialties available to women.

To be eligible for enlistment, women must have a high school diploma or GED equivalency certificate, qualify on a test administered and graded at the Navy office, be physically acceptable for enlistment and be available to undergo eight weeks of basic training in Orlando, Fla.

Guaranteed schooling is available in administrative, graphic arts, supply, accounting, operations, medical, dental, electrical, ordnance, mechanics and selected technical and electronics specialties.

Kinzig says "Some women are even going into guaranteed heavy equipment operator schools, and everyone is started at a salary of over \$305 per month. Advancement is competitive and is based on knowledge of the job." More information may be obtained in room 113 of the Carr Building.

Secrets of engines to be revealed

Recognizing the fact that many women seem to know only that their car motors start, usually, when they turn the ignition key and stop when they turn the key off, the YMCA-WEIU Program Committee and Fiermonte Chevy Town, Inc., are co-sponsoring a new program, "Car Care Clinic" to give women an opportunity to get a simplified understanding of how their cars operate and how to recognize signs of trouble before they become more serious. Lyman Strong, known better as "Popeye", service department supervisor at the Fiermonte agency, will explain the basics of how a car works, demonstrate the signs and sounds of the most common disorders, give advice on how to get the best value for one's money in buying the new or used car best suited to their needs, and how
