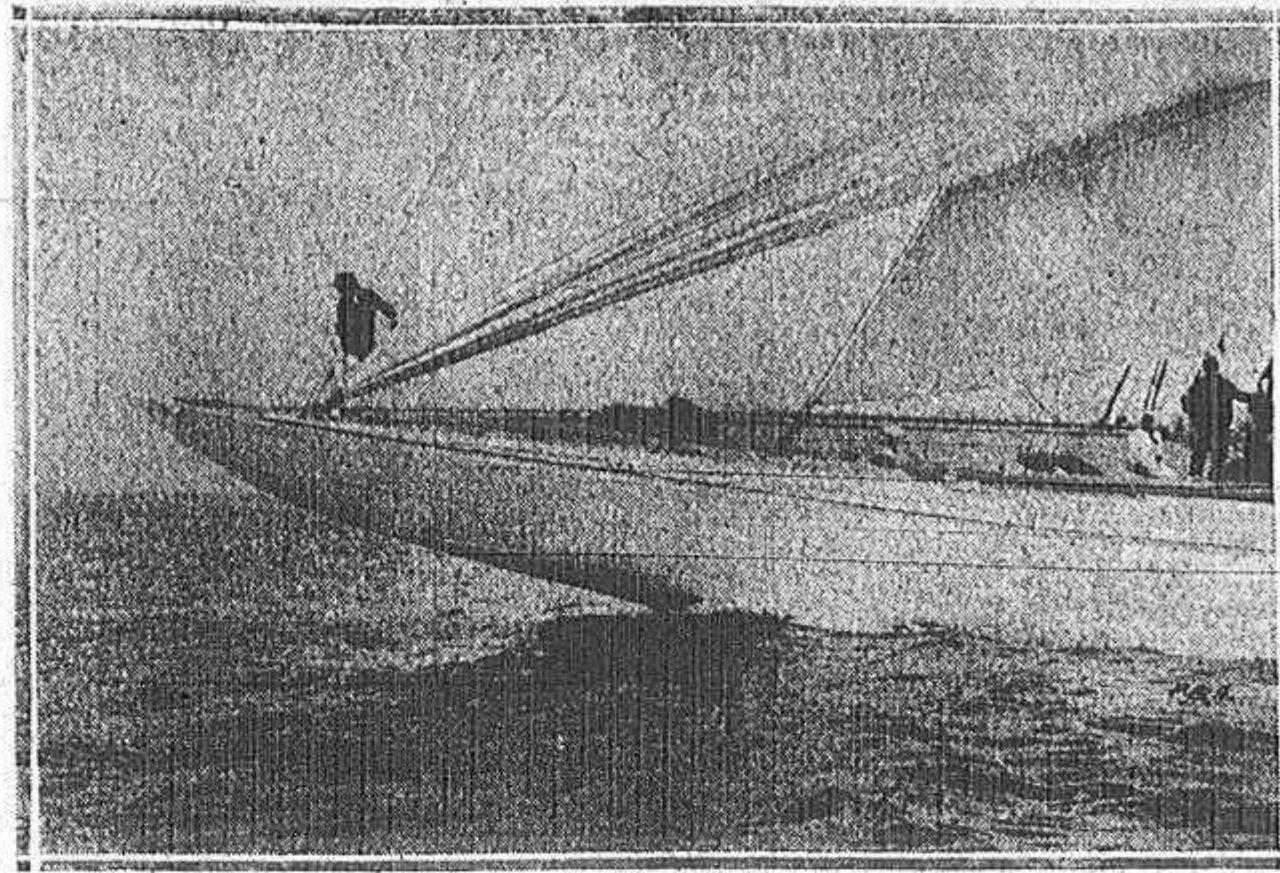

Smooth Sailing For Harbors Bill Predicted Now

Washington, June 7.—The "pork barrel" rivers and harbors bill, over which such a hue and cry was raised last week, indicating a possible filibuster endangering its passage, seems to have fairly smooth sailing ahead of it as the prospects have died down to a little more than a murmur. It is scheduled to come up in the Senate just as soon as the tariff is out of the way.

Vandenberg Lacks Support Senator Vandenberg of Michigan, who said that the bill "is not a pork barrel; it is a hoghead," was to have led the filibuster. His canvass of the Senate to find opponents of the bill has not been very successful. A number of Senators agree with him that the bill is much too large and carries many bad features, but Vandenberg found few willing to carry their disapproval of the measure to the extent of voting against it.

Thirty-five States are down for a share of the total authorized to be expended in rivers and harbors improvement—approximately \$225,000,000. This makes too many members of Congress beneficiaries of the legislation to expect it can be defeated, or even pared down to any extent. The bill, however, only authorizes the appropriation of certain sums for specified projects. It does not appropriate the money itself. That will be left to succeeding Congresses. The fact that the Budget Bureau indicates what revenues will be available for future appropriation, will no doubt give proper protection to the Treasury, which may be in for a series of lean years.

Hoover's Restraining Hand Then, too, there is the restraining hand of the President. After appropriations have been made he would have the discretionary power to expend the money at once or over a number of years. It is expected that the total sum authorized will probably be expended over a period of from 8 to 10 years at best, unless the treasury income can be made to continue at or near its continued high levels of recent years. The bill has its outspoken friends, however, among whom is Senator Hiram Johnson of California, Commerce Committee chairman. "On the whole, it is a good bill and a clean one," said Mr. Johnson. "We anticipate that it will provide a row, but if the Illinois waterway and the Erie Canal provisions are satisfactory to the Senators interested we believe it will pass without delay."

Erie Barge Canal Feature Opposed The proposal to have the Federal Government take over the control and operation of the Erie Barge Canal, in New York State, is one of the items in the bill most objected to by Senator Vandenberg and his backers. This group is mortally afraid that the St. Lawrence waterway development will be abandoned in favor of the All-American route, of which the Erie Canal is an integral part, as sponsored by Senator Copeland, and Representative Dempsey of New York. The Newtown Creek Improvement, which is sponsored by Representative George Lindsay of Brooklyn, although reported too late by the chief of engineers to be included in either the House or Senate bill, is proposed in an amendment offered to the Senate bill by Senator Copeland of New York. Senator Copeland's amendment proposes the adoption of the recommendation of the Board of Engineers, which would provide an additional \$269,500 for improvement, although Major Gen-

eral Brown, chief of engineers, recommended only additional authorization of \$10,000 for the work. Senator Copeland is expected to press for the adoption of his amendment.

New Appointments For Swedish Hospital Dr. Edward Costelloe has been appointed attending pediatrician of the Swedish Hospital in Brooklyn and Dr. Ervald Olsson has been appointed attending orthopedist, according to an announcement made yesterday by Dr. Gerard Kasper, secretary of the directors. Architects for the hospital, it was announced, are progressing with plans for remodeling the Hotel Chatelaine, Bedford Ave. and Dear St., which was purchased by the hospital several months ago and which the hospital will take over on October 1. Dr. Kasper announced that Dr. Sutherland Miller has been named chairman of the monthly scientific conferences held by the medical staff and Dr. Samuel Lubin, vice chairman. New officers of the staff who will serve during the year are Dr. Harold A. Morris, president; Dr. Charles E. Hamilton, vice-president; Dr. Louis Blumenfeld, secretary, and Dr. John O. Peterson, treasurer.

Bail Bond License Restored to Tighe Joseph Tighe, well known Brooklyn bail bond agent, yesterday received notice from Superintendent of Insurance Conway that his license, recently suspended by Conway, has been restored to him. The restoration followed Tighe's action in filing a certiorari proceeding before the Appellate Division. The bondsman, in his suit, contended that he had written bonds for 15 years without a complaint, being fined against him, and contended that his indebtedness to companies he formerly represented was due to paying off forfeitures, and that these concerns were agreeable to his arrangements with them. Conway's letter stated that the restoration was granted pending trial of Tighe's action or permanent rescinding of the revocation.

Will Leave \$175,562 To Widow and Son Charles B. Mills, who died Dec. 7, 1928, at 7022 Ridge Boulevard, left a gross estate of \$181,924 and a net estate of \$175,562, according to an appraisal filed with Surrogate Wingate. The residue of the estate, which includes a seat on the New York Curb market, goes to the testator's wife, Eloise, of the Ridge Boulevard. The seat is valued at \$160,000. Kenneth Mills, a son, of the same address, receives jewelry and \$2,000.

Brooklyn Nurses Go To Two Conventions Miss Elizabeth Stringer, executive director of the Visiting Nurse Association of Brooklyn, and Miss Marion Ballantyne, supervisor of orthopedic nurses, will represent the Brooklyn association at the biennial convention of the National Organization for Public Health Nursing in Milwaukee this week. The convention will be held simultaneously with conventions of the American Nurses Association and of the National League for Nursing Education. Miss Harmina Stokes, educational director of the Visiting Nurse Association, will represent the association at the National Conference of Social Work to be held this week in Boston.

Brooklynite Held in \$200 Bail on Ship Law Charge Frank S. Bove, 32, of 192 State St., yesterday was held in \$200 bail for a hearing on June 18 on a charge of violating the ship law in consideration of a promise to secure a job on a ship for a man. He was held by United States Commissioner Martin C. Epstein. Bove was arrested on complaint of Walter A. Randall of Middleton, Conn., who alleged he gave Bove \$30 to secure a post on a ship for him. He alleges the money was never returned and he never got the job.

City Club Finds Some Subways Not Crowded

Willing to Accept Greater Loads in Four Types of Cars Than Transit Commission Approves—Chairman Fullen Answers Criticism

In three out of the four types of New York City subway cars the City Club, which has been protesting against indecent congestion, is willing to accept greater crowding than the Transit Commission, according to comparisons made by the Commission's Service Bureau. The City Club feels that decency will be maintained with a load of eight more in the B. M. T. triplex cars than the Service Bureau is willing to accept as a standard. The City Club would permit 15 more persons to "shoehorn" into an I. R. T. car than the Transit Commission thinks is "reasonable congestion." It would permit 30 more to jam themselves into the new four-door type of car that the city proposes to operate in its new tubes than the State body regards as proper. Only in the case of the big standard cars in the B. M. T. subway would the Transit Commission experts stand for more people than the City Club—and the difference there is only three.

The comparisons became known when Chairman William G. Fullen answered by letter the criticism of the City Club with respect to overcrowding in the subways. He said: "Although the Commission has not approved and, as you will appreciate, cannot properly approve of a standard for overcrowding still its respect to loading that is approximately the same as that approved by the organization." Mr. Fullen explained in behalf of the Transit Commission that the standards of its Service Bureau were theoretical and could not be enforced from a practical stand-
