T. L. CUYLER SAFE, SISTER IS TOLD

Retired Brother of Mrs. Cheesman and Wife Escape Injury in Japan.

A cable dispatch received from Earl R. Dickover, American Consul at Kobe, by Mrs. W. S. Cheesman of 108 South Street gave assurance that Theodore L. Cuyler, her brother, for many years Treasurer of the Postal Telegraph Cable Company, and now retired, survived the Japanese earthquake without injury. Consul Dickover cabled: "Rev. Scott of Nagasaki states Cuyler safe." Mr. Cuyler is the son of the late Rev. Theodore L. Cuyler, who was pastor of the Lafayette Avenue Presbyterian Church of Brooklyn for 30 years. With Mrs. Cuyler, he was expected to reach Yokohama on Aug. 28. No word concerning them had come since the catastrophe. Mrs. Cuyler is also safe.

PLATFORM OF G.O.P. CITY CANDIDATES

At a meeting of the Republican City Committee, which met last evening at the Grill Room of the Osborne House, plans were outlined for the fall campaign and discussions of the various candidates ensued. Arrangements were made for the opening of headquarters over the C. R. Leary clothing store with Samuel French placed in charge. Mr. French has officiated in this capacity for the past 25 years.

The Republican candidates for city officers are: Roy A. Weld for mayor, J. Joseph Byrne and Howard J. Lindsay for full term councilmen, Fred W. Andrews to fill an unexpired term on the council. Charles A. Wright for recorder, Kennard Underwood for city judge and Louis K. R. Laird for justice of the peace. Sanford G. Lyon of Aurora is Republican candidate for re-election as assemblyman and Benn Kenyon for district attorney. Dr. Paul N. Parker of Moravia is candidate for coroner.

The following statement was given out today on behalf of the Republican candidates for mayor and councilmen:

"In this campaign we feel that the position of the Republican candidates before the electors should be absolutely clear. We stand and shall stand if elected entirely and only for the best interests of the City of Auburn. To be specific, we believe:

(1) That the streets should be properly kept up and that all pavements should be kept in the best possible repair, the highest business ability and integrity being at all times employed in letting the contracts.

(2) That the interests of the city should be carefully guarded and protected in its business dealings with contractors and others in the same manner that the interests of a private organization are guarded.

(3) That the personnel of the Fire Department should be maintained at its present high state of efficiency and the equipment should be improved and kept up to date in order that the property in the city may be protected from fire and that insurance rates may be kept at the lowest possible rates.

(4) That the Water Department should be maintained on an absolutely business basis and in the highest possible state of efficiency. The city's investment in this proposition is large and must be protected.

(5) We stand for the enforcement of the laws. We believe that the Police Department should be maintained in the interests of the
