SENTENCES AND FINES IMPOSED

Adjourned Term of County Court Full of Action.

Several defendants indicted by the October Grand Jury were arraigned before County Judge Edgar S. Mosher at an adjourned term of County Court held at the Federal Building this morning. Most of the defendants sentenced were charged with violation of the state motor vehicle law, driving automobiles while they were in an intoxicated condition. In several instances Judge Mosher imposed a prohibition oath to which defendants pledged themselves to abstain from liquor for a term of two years.

Andrew See, indicted for possession of firearms without a permit, entered a plea of guilty and sentence will be imposed next week.

Edward Plien pleaded guilty to an indictment charging grand larceny in first degree in connection with the sale of a motor truck on which John Stoner of Auburn had a lien. Plien lives in Ber Creek and has a wife and six children. Attorney Kenyon stated that Plien had made full restitution and recommended parole. Judge Mosher deferred passing of sentence pending the good behavior of Plien and paroled him with Probation Officer Bowker for two years.

Ignatz Troznar indicted for the crime of robbery in the first degree, entered a plea of not guilty and his case will be No. 1 for trial next Monday. He is charged with taking \$26 from a Polish fellow in Lower Street Street several weeks ago. Erna Furman and Harold Stine, indicted for robbery in connection with the same offense, did not plead, their cases being deferred until next week.

Harold Collier, indicted for unlawful escape from the prison farm in Sennett on August 20, was given a sentence of two more years in Auburn Prison. District Attorney Kenyon waived the count charging previous conviction of a felony.

Martin Mahar, indicted for unlawful escape from the prison road camp in the Town of Scipio, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to two years in Auburn Prison. Mahar made a plea for leniency, calling attention to the fact that he had led a respectable life in Amsterdam for the past three years and wanted another chance. Judge Mosher made it plain that he will cooperate with the prison authorities to make escapes impossible, so far as is humanly possible.

Fined \$100.
Goodwin C. Hamlin of Syracuse was fined \$100 for driving automobile in an intoxicated condition on the Grant Avenue road several months ago.

John Pils, indicted for violation of the state motor vehicle law, driving automobile while he was in an intoxicated condition in State Street last Summer, pleaded guilty. He was sentenced to one month in the county jail and fined \$100. He was paroled for two years and an order entered revoking his automobile license.

Lawrence Seroczyk of Scipio, indicted for the same crime, was sentenced to jail for one month, fined \$250, no parole for two years, had auto license revoked and surrendered and was ordered to pay damage to a trolley car into which he crashed near the corner of Olympia and State Streets.

Charles Daley of Auburn and Clarence Wallace of Stewart's Corners and William Woods of Auburn pleaded guilty to the same crime and received the usual sentence, the \$100 fine, one month in jail, parole and revocation of the auto license.

Lewis Miles of Groton pleaded not guilty to an indictment charging driving an auto while he was in an intoxicated condition in Locke. Arrangements for trial will be made between his attorneys Miles, Heath and District Attorney Kenyon.

John Dempsey of Lansing pleaded guilty to driving an auto while he was intoxicated in Fleming. Passing of sentence was deferred to December 10.

Joseph Smith indicted for driving auto while he was in an intoxicated condition and also for riot and George Bush and John Corbett, indicted for riot, all pleaded not guilty through their attorney Harry A. Gleason. The trio was arrested following row on highway in Sennett a few weeks ago.

Charles Cynlich, the Seneca County "bone doctor", pleaded not guilty to two indictments. One charged unlawful practice of medicine without a license and the other manslaughter in the first and second degree. His arrest followed the death of Peter Gerowski in Pultisfer Street last June. He will be defended on trial next week by Attorney Albert H. Clark.

Peter McGuinness of Waterloo, pleaded guilty to driving an auto while intoxicated last Summer in Grant Avenue. He was given the usual sentence of one month in jail, fine of \$100, parole and revocation of auto license.

Foley Pleads Guilty.
John Foley of No. 8 Standard Avenue pleaded guilty to an indictment charging grand larceny in the second degree, the theft of tobacco from the New York Central Railroad Company. He was foreman in the freight house. Foley was represented by Attorney Edwin W. Leary. Sentence was deferred until early next week.

CO-EDS GO ON RECORD AGAINST DRINKING BY STUDENTS OF BOTH SEXES

Madison, Wis., Nov. 16.—By an unanimous vote last night, 3,000 University of Wisconsin co-eds went on record as opposed to drinking among students of both sexes and decided to appeal to federal authorities to check drinking and its sources in Madison.

A resolution prohibiting co-eds from "dating" with men who drink, failed to pass. Protesting this resolution, girls attending the meeting chorused "how can we tell if they have been drinking?"

The resolution adopted declared "that the women of Wisconsin go on record as opposed to drinking and that the women of Wisconsin shall sign a petition and present it to the federal authorities in order to have definite action taken against intoxication and its sources in the city of Madison."

Lois Jacobs, president of the Girls' Government Organization, who called the meeting declared that unless conditions were checked the enrollment of women would be considerably lower next year. The Daily Cardinal, student publication, declared editorially after the home coming of the football team, that the "annual drunk is over."
