\$30,000,000 MORE IS GRANTED RAILROAD EXPRESS EMPLOYES

U. S. Labor Board Makes Award Retroactive to May 1 and Affecting 80,000 Men—Rates to Be Raised to Meet Increase.

Chicago, Aug. 10.—Thirty million dollars was added today to the nation's express bill. The United States Railway Labor Board awarded the 80,000 employees of the American Railway Express Company an increase of 16 cents an hour. The decision is retroactive to May 1, 1920.

AMERICAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE SOON TO BE NO MORE

Washington, Aug. 10.—The American expeditionary forces will pass into history August 31 when the only remaining unit of the army that fought in France, A. E. F. headquarters here, ceases to exist. Records of the great army will be transferred to custody of the War Department and the following day General Pershing will open headquarters in his new capacity as general of the army.

COX VOTES IN PRIMARY
