

ESCAPED CONVICT TAKEN IN ST. LOUIS

Flalkowski Charged With Robbing Grocery. IDENTIFIED AS ONE WHO FLED VICTORY

Will Probably Be Brought Back to Face Auburn Escape Charge.

Thomas Flalkowski, 29, escaped Auburn Prison inmate, sentenced from Buffalo for an indeterminate

sentence for shooting a sweetheart, who later recovered, was arrested in St. Louis, Mo., Thanksgiving Eve, charged with robbing a grocery store.

He escaped from the prison road camp in the Town of Victory August 14 with two other convict laborers. The getaway was made in a light truck stolen from Stephen Pink of Spring Lake.

One of the inmates was armed with a gun. The locker of William Hutchings, guard in charge of the camp, was broken into, and when he ran to his locker for his weapon, it was gone. A swamp in the vicinity of the road camp, which was thought to be the hiding place of the trio of convicts, was searched for several days by state troopers, prison guards and sheriff's deputies while all roads were placed under a heavy guard.

Flalkowski will probably be returned immediately to the local prison to face the escape charge.

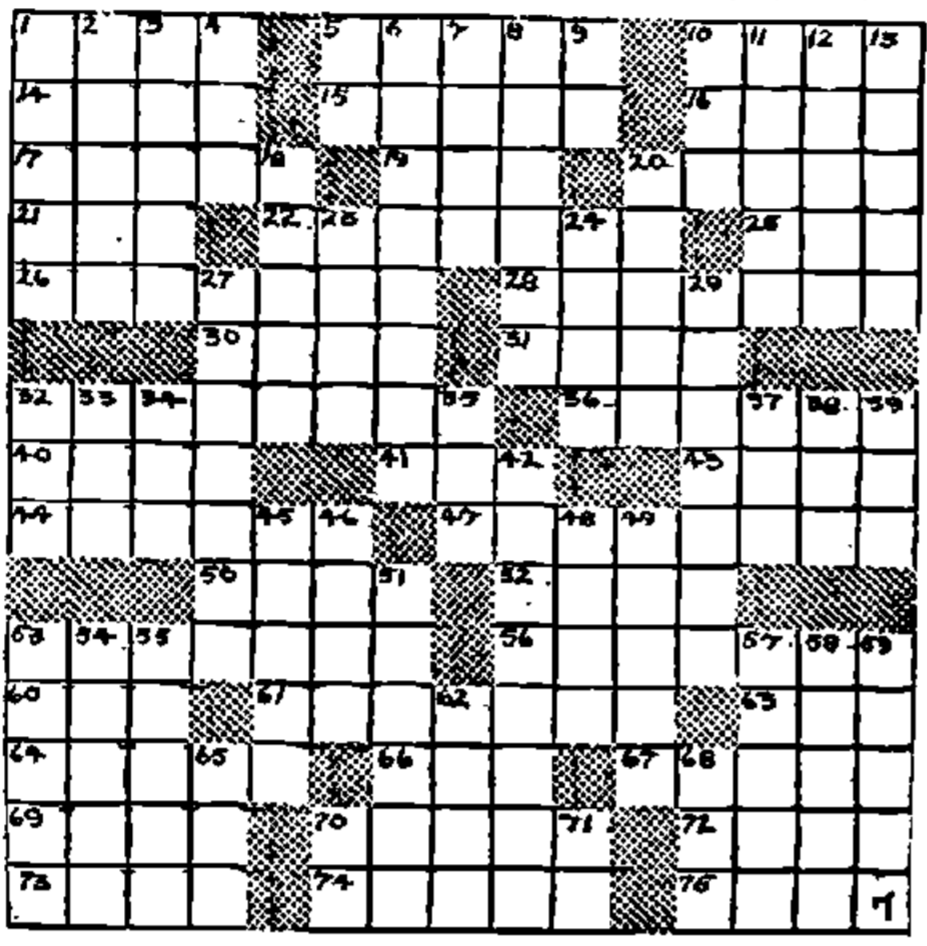
