

WITNESSED BY EXAMINED IN MAY'S DEATH

Coroner Almy Finds Him Not Guilty of Any Crime in Decision on Woodport Gym Tragedy

The decision of Coroner Dr. Raymond C. Almy in the death of Clarence L. Quinn, 16, of Woodport, fatally injured in a fight in the gymnasium of the Woodport High School on June 15, was filed in the county clerk's office today. Coroner Almy found that Quinn died as the result of a fractured skull and a subdural hemorrhage. "I find no premeditation on the part of Roscoe Simmons and do not find him guilty of any crime," he decided. The coroner said that several boys of ages 13 to 17 were playing a scrub game of basketball unsupervised in the school gymnasium; that they chose sides, deeded playing on one team and Simmons on the other; that deceased tripped Simmons as he was about to throw for a basket. Simmons did not fall to the floor but lost possession of the ball to Quinn. Then as Quinn was about to throw a basket Simmons tripped him. Soon after Quinn struck Simmons and the fight proceeded. This version of the fight was told by practically each witness.

MORAVIA TO VOTE ON PAVEMENT FOR KEELER AVE.

A special election for the village of Moravia has been called for August 1 and a proposition relative to the paving of Keeler Avenue will be submitted. Voting in the Fire Department Building will be from 5 o'clock in the afternoon until 9 o'clock in the evening. The proposition calls for the paving of that portion of the street beginning at North Main Street west 725 feet with concrete 24 feet wide with curbing, and also that portion of the street extending further west to the intersection of West Cayuga Street to be paved with macadam 14 feet wide, at a total cost not to exceed \$10,000. The proposition appropriates said sum for the improvement and provides such appropriation shall be met by borrowing on bonds of the village and that there shall be raised annually by tax upon taxable property a sum sufficient to pay interest on and principal of said bonds as same shall become due.

GERMAN 'PEACE' Loan Is Denied By Chamberlain

The first session was devoted largely to formalities but was expected to get down to business when the two governments issued statements outlining the methods and scope of the conference.

Officials aboard the sunboat were instructed also to investigate the detection by Japanese of a British passenger and freight lighter. The Japanese army Manchukuo reported Soviet-Mongol forces had strengthened their positions east of the Khalka River where frontier fighting has flared sporadically since May 11.

Removal of two generals, both civil war heroes, from their posts was considered as evidence of the growing power of the pro-Italian Fascists led by Franco's brother-in-law, Interior Minister Ramon Serrano Suner.

London, July 24.—(AP)—Prime Minister Chamberlain told the House of Commons today of an agreement with Japan in which the British government undertook to co-operation as acts in North China prejudicial to the Japanese "purpose of safeguarding their own security."
