

FUND TOTAL TONIGHT IN WMBO FLASH

These Are Last Hours of Campaign and Final Reports Are Called For — Leaders Hope Radio Report Will Be Victory, and No 4 Per Cent Drag As Was Case Year Ago — Last Appeal To Canvassers

Results of the current \$175,000 United Wartime Fund Drive in Cayuga County will be released in a special "flash" announcement at 9:30 this evening over Radio Station WMBO, according to Co-Chairmen Paul W. Myers and Charles Goldman, who have asked all workers to have all reports in for the final check-up this evening.

Division heads, captains, ward and district leaders, plant and town chairmen will meet at 7 p. m. in Hotel Osborne when the final "score" will be released by Campaign Director Kenneth R. Koster. Calling attention to the importance of total coverage of cards, Koster stated this morning: "The success or failure of this campaign rests on what happens on this final Monday, Oct. 30. A miracle alone can save this campaign, and miracles can be wrought by people doing their work effectively. Don't say 'well, two or three unseen prospects won't affect the campaign.' Those two or three needles may mean the difference between failure or success. Rally Opens Party's Final Week of Campaigning. Several Speakers — Three Meetings Next Sunday

A large rally for the Fourth Ward was held Sunday evening in the Polish Home in State Street under the auspices of the Cayuga County Democratic Committee. The purpose of the campaign was outlined by local and out of town speakers.

J. Joseph Boyle, county chairman, opened the meeting and turned the gavel over to Peter P. Bommerbach. The speakers were Mayor Edward T. Boyle, former Mayor Charles D. Osborne, Democratic state committeeman; William Ruzycski, Buffalo editor and radio commentator; Mrs. Sophie Michalski, Buffalo social worker and secretary of the Auxiliary of the Polish Veterans of Erie County; Frank J. Erwin of Yates County, candidate for Congress; Lewis B. Earl of Conquest, candidate for member of Assembly; Francis B. Edwards of Oriskany, candidate for state senator, and Mrs. Frances B. Sprague of Weadepot, associate state committeewoman.

The 1944 city Democratic campaign will be marked with a whirlwind finish Sunday, November 5, with three large rallies on the schedule. The first will be held at 12:30 at the Russian National Club in Cottage Street.
