

# Auburn Gets Chance to Greet Its New Vocestra

### Stable Orchestra of 30 Pieces and Glee Club of 30 Voices To Give Concert Next Monday Evening - All Acclaimed in Port Byron Debut—Soloists To Be Heard in Both Sections

An unusually brisk ticket sale for the spring concert at West High School next Monday evening, March 21 by Auburn's newly organized vochestra indicates a mounting interest in director Harold Henderson's latest creation. A glee club composed of 30 members and with five years of experience will perform with a 30 piece studio orchestra which includes the top musicians of the area.

A program of inspiring and pleasant music has been planned in an effort to entertain everyone. There will be rousing songs by the male chorus, effective harmonies by combined men and women's voices of the whole glee club, special numbers by the orchestra alone, as well as arrangements to bring out all the possibilities of the entire group performing together.

In addition to group work there will be several outstanding soloists headed by Florentine Piatek, former Philadelphia and Indianapolis vochestra violinist. Featured soloists include Yolanda Cafaratti, Vivian Cafaratti, Lois Beardsley, Doris Ridley, Arthur Beardsley, and Edwin Young.

## Teenagers Carry Out Suicide Pact

Talcott, W. Va., March 15—(UP)—The parents of two teenage sweethearts today planned a double funeral for their children, who carried out a suicide pact because they could not get married.

Suicide was the "only way out" Mary Alice Kirby, 14, told her mother before she died. Mrs. Ray Kirby was standing at a kitchen window when she heard a shot and saw Ernest Smith, Jr., 16, fall to the ground. She rushed outside as her daughter picked up a shotgun and fired a blast into her chest.

Lying in her mother's arms, Mary told how they despaired of marriage because "Ernest didn't have a job." Smith and Mary both attended Talcott High School and were "going steady" for almost a year. School Principal Weldon Boone said Mary was a popular student, mature for her age. Smith, he said, seemed disinterested in student activities and once quit school during his freshman year.

High school classmates will act as pallbearers at the funeral tomorrow. The parents may have the boy and girl buried together. Home-Heating Facts Tax Albany, N. Y., March 15—(AP)—A bill to exempt home-heating fuels from state-authorized local sales taxes was before the Assembly today.

The measure, introduced by Senator John H. Hughes, Syracuse, Republican, was passed by the Senate yesterday. The bill would exempt the state's permissive local tax law to exempt "fuel used exclusively for domestic purposes."

Early Harbor Opening Buffalo, N. Y., March 15—(AP)—The Lakes Freighter Perseus moved out of the Buffalo Harbor early today. The harbor opening was the earliest since March 15, 1925. The Perseus had 7,000 tons of pig iron aboard and was headed for Detroit. The ship is owned by the Nicholson Transit Co.

## Russians To Attend U. S. Confab

Washington, March 16—(AP)—The State Department announced today that 23 delegates from Russia and Soviet bloc countries will be permitted to attend a "world peace" conference in New York this month.

Five Hungarians who asked to attend were barred, however, in retaliation for Hungary's recent actions toward American diplomatic officials.

In announcing the decision, the State Department charged that none of the Soviet bloc delegates at the conference would be free to "express any view other than that dictated by the political authorities in Moscow."

## Portland Papers Out on Schedule
