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Several Auburn Creditors Listed In Woodport Bankruptcy Petition

Utica, April 19—Liquidation of their financial affairs in bankruptcy is asked today by William T. Burrow, a salesman, and Christina A. Burrow, a saleslady, of 30 South Seneca Street, Woodport. They filed a bankruptcy petition in Federal Court here saying until October 1 last they operated the business of Borrow's Roofing and Siding Company.

Debts amount to \$7,518 and assets include fixtures, \$484 and accounts. It is according to the petition filed through Attorney George M. Michaels and Francis J. Smith of Auburn.
