Excellent co-operation from city residents was reported. The necessity of getting the waste materials to the curb bright and early was again stressed by city officials.

BODY OF SOLDIER WILL ARRIVE IN CITY WEDNESDAY

The body of Pfc. Donald T. Conroy, who was killed in action March 8, 1945, at Perum, Germany, will arrive in Auburn at 7 a. m. (DST) Wednesday for final military rites and burial.

The Catholic War Veterans will be in charge of the military services.

Pfc. Conroy was born in Auburn on October 13, 1918. He joined the United States Infantry on June 24, 1941, and went overseas in June, 1944. He married Martha Dixon in September, 1940. The heroic soldier was a graduate of St. Mary's School and of East High School. Before entering the service he held a supervisory position with the Mohican Company.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Anthony J. Conroy of Syracuse, formerly of Auburn; a sister, Mrs. David Neuman; a nephew, Neil Neuman, both of Syracuse but native Auburnians; several aunts, uncles and cousins who reside in this city.

Funeral services will be held at the home of the soldier's uncle, Gerald T. Conroy, 25 Garrow Street, at 9:30 a. m. Saturday, with further services at 10 a. m. in St. Mary's Church. Burial will be in St. Joseph's Cemetery.
