

# Distribution of 'Y' Circulars Prelude to Camp Season

### Many Improvements Planned This Year, Chairman J. Marshall Hunter Declares — Dannenhauer To Be Camp Director —Successful Season Indicated

Distribution Friday of some 1600 copies of the 1948 YMCA Camp Prospectus marked the official announcement of the 36th season in which the local YMCA has been conducting a resident summer camp for boys.

The Camp Committee has been spending time on plans for improvements to be made before the season officially opens July 1.

A contribution of \$700 from the Emerson Foundation has made the relocation and improvement of kitchen facilities possible, according to J. Marshall Hunter, chairman of the Camp Committee.

The Women's Auxiliary of the YMCA has accepted the project of providing a new sixteen foot dish washing and rinsing sink.

Mr. Hunter stated also that the committee hoped to add an eight by sixteen foot enclosed building to provide better washing facilities for the boys.

The Archery court is to be improved, together with other minor improvements.

Robert M. Dannenhauer, Boys' Work Secretary of the local Y.M.C.A., has been selected Camp Director. Mr. Dannenhauer is a graduate of Springfield College and has had wide experience in

camping.

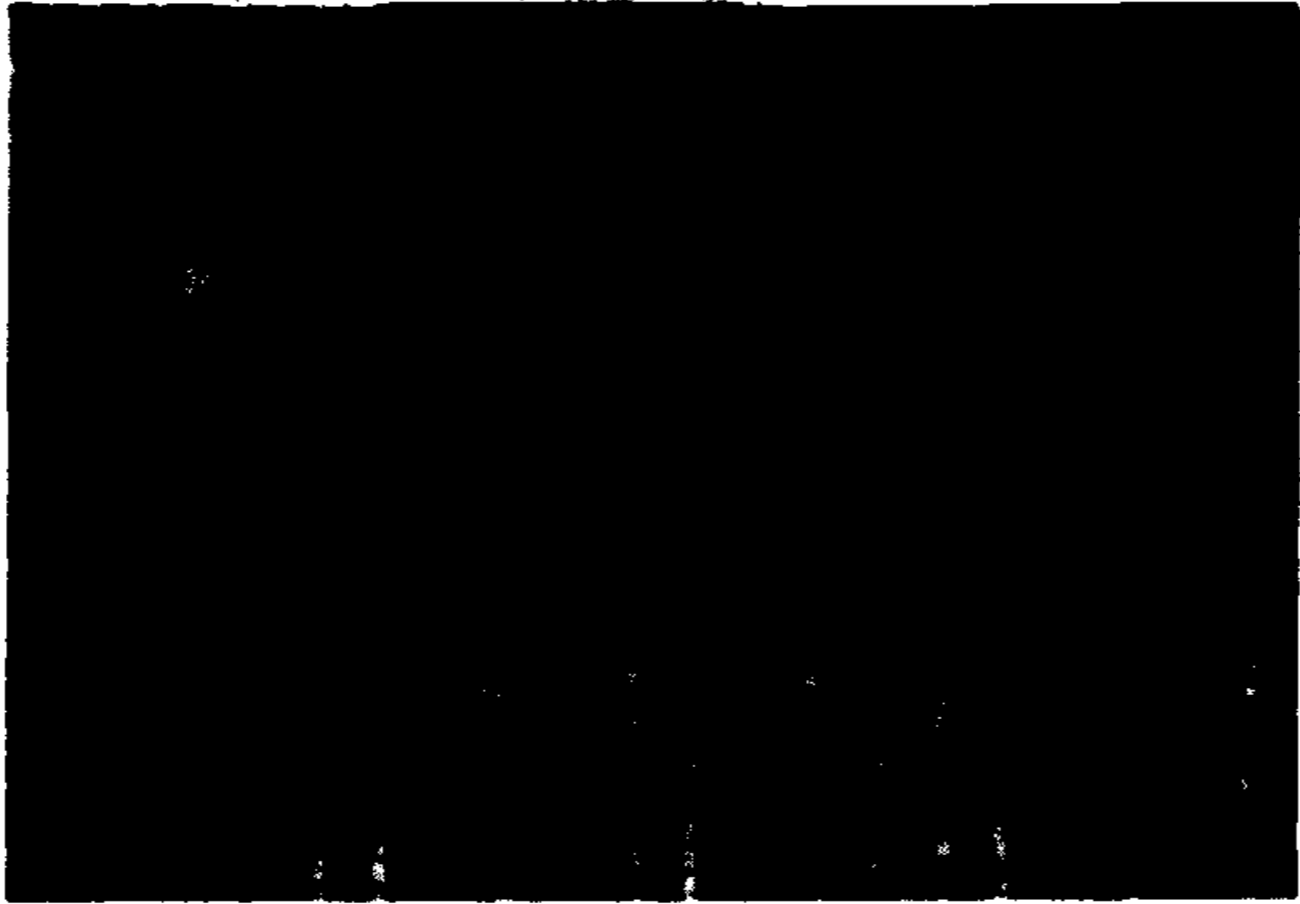

Announcement of the complete camp staff will be made in a few days. Many new camp features are to be added and major emphasis at the "Y" now is toward making the present season the most successful in many years.
