Austin, Tex., June 24 — (AP) — Three men from the South and one from the Pacific coast moved into semi-finals of the National Collegiate Tennis tournament today. Sam Match, whose San Francisco University has virtually clinched the team championship, meets Fred Kovaleski of William and Mary in one match. Herbert (Buddy) Behrens of Rollins clashes with Jack Tuero of Tulane in the other. All are seeded players but not from the top. Both No. 1 Vic Seixas of North Carolina and No. 2 Herb Flam of UCLA have been eliminated. Doubles semi-finals are scheduled this afternoon with only one seeded team—Match and Art Larson of San Francisco—left. Match and Larson, seeded third, play Chick Harris and Jack Turpin of Rice while Fred Fisher and Jim Brink of Washington clash in the other match. Yesterday was a day for the lower-seeded boys to set up. Behrens, rated No. 7, kicked out Flam, 5-7, 6-1, 6-8, while eight-seeded Tuero whammed fourth-seeded Larson, 3-6, 6-4. The only members of the top five to hold up were third-seeded Match who beat Gardner Larned of Rollins, sixth-seeded, 6-3, 6-0, and fifth-seeded Kovaleski, who subdued unseeded Gene Garrett of UCLA, 6-4, 6-4. In yesterday's quarter-finals doubles play Harris and Turpin staged a surprise in kicking out second-seeded Flam and Garrett, 6-4, 6-8. Match and Larson ran into trouble in taking out Kovaleski and Howe Atwater of William and Mary 6-3, 14-12. Brink and Fisher beat Larned and Behrens 7-5, 6-4, and Felix Kelley and Bobby Goldfarb of Texas trimmed fourth-seeded Seixas and Clark Taylor of North Carolina, 9-7, 6-3. San Francisco took a lead of a point in the battle for the team title. With five points already in the bag and two entries still in the tournament, San Francisco appears a certainty for the championship. Rollins is second with four points and one man left.

## A. F. L. Union Will Continue To Be Bargaining Agent at Plant on Employees' 61 to 19 Decision

In an N.L.R.B. election held Thursday at the Auburn Spark Plug Co. plant to determine the bargaining agent for the United Auto Workers, A.F.L., were chosen by the employees by a margin of more than three to one. The vote was U.A.W.-A.F.L. 61, U.F.E.W.-C.I.O., 18, and for no union, one vote. The U.A.W.-A.F.L. had been the bargaining agent for seven years, but the U.F.E.W.-C.I.O., recently intervened, claiming that a majority of the workers wished to change affiliation. We have successfully ironed out our differences over the conference table, without interruption of production for the company or loss of salary to our workers. Joseph Palumbo, international representative of the U.A.W.-A.F.L., stated: "I am naturally pleased with the vote of confidence rendered my international Union by the employees of the Auburn Spark Plug plant. Interrupted contract negotiations may now be renewed with every assurance of an early and satisfactory conclusion."
