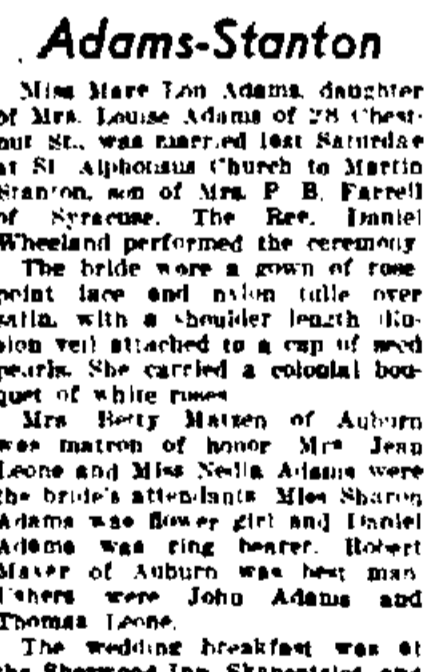

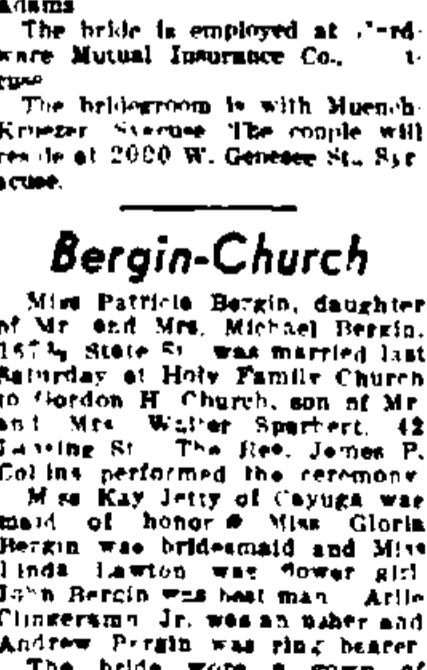

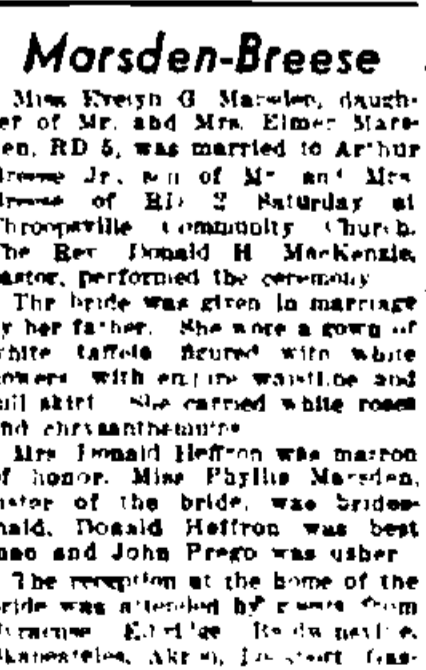

Fire Ruins Barn; Damage Is \$1,200

A fire of unknown origin destroyed a barn in the Town of Sterling about midnight last night, the Cayuga County Sheriff's Department said today. Damage, estimated by the Sheriff's office at \$1,200 was covered by insurance.

The 20-by-40 foot frame structure on the Crankatt Road about one half mile out of Marietta was owned by Gilbert Shute. It was partially filled with hay.

Chief Lloyd Tyler of the Hamilton Fire Department directed about 60 firemen at the scene. Firemen reported that when the Hamilton department arrived at the scene the barn had been reduced to a frame and little could be done to save it. The Fair Haven Fire Department was also called to the blaze.

Firemen said that the wind blew sparks to property across the road, however, damage to nearby buildings was avoided.

Deputy Sheriff William McLane, who directed traffic at the scene said there was no wiring in the building.

Levitt Says GOP Makes It Difficult For Public Loans

ROCHESTER (AP)—State Comptroller Arthur Levitt yesterday blamed the Eisenhower Administration for "difficulties in borrowing capital funds for public enterprises."

In an address to the State Bar Association meeting here, Levitt said the Republican administration's "hard money policy" was directly responsible for the difficulties.

He said the "hard money policy" was first tried in 1953 and was "reversed six months later when it threatened to put the entire economy in a tailspin."

Levitt said the program was revived this spring to halt inflation, reduce installment buying and discourage unnecessary borrowing.

"We know that counties, cities, villages, towns or school districts find it increasingly difficult to float bond issues for the building of schools, health facilities, water supply and sewage disposal systems," he said.

The severe impact of higher interest rates upon the burden of the state and local governments is being felt throughout the country, he added.
