

Mayor praises Purple Lancers

The Purple Lancers, hailed by Mayor Paul W. Lattimore as probably the greatest youth organization in the area, were praised at the annual Christmas Party presented by the Purple Lancers Social Club Sunday night at St. Francis School.

However, the Lancers were not the only ones praised as the Carmelite-Indecato American Legion Post, the Board of Directors of the Lancers, and the parents were all subject to oral tributes.

Mayor Lattimore based his comments on the fact the Lancers operate 12 months a year, whereas other programs for the youth in the community are seasonal. Also, with over 200 participating in the Purple Lancers and the Lancer Cadets, he said this was keeping the children off the streets.

The Cadets were honored at a Christmas Party at St. Francis last week with 257 children and parents in attendance. About 150 attended last night's event.

"This past summer marked the return of the Lancers as a competition corps and their record was outstanding. They chalked up several victories, including the coveted Penn-York Association contest in Rochester."

The C-I Post was lauded for sponsoring the program by Richard Opdycke, Cayuga County American Legion commander. He also praised the parents for contributing to the overall program.

However, Mayor Lattimore gave the keynote address and extended the appreciation of the entire community to the Purple Lancers themselves and to the board of directors for their many hours of work.

Charles Riffe, assistant chairman of the corps, served as master of ceremonies for the program. Seated at the head table were Mr. and Mrs. Harold Ide, he being called "Mr. Drum Corps" in Auburn for his participation for so many years; Corps chairman and Mrs. Leo Ryan, representing the Weedsport Volunteer Fire Department; Mr. and Mrs. J. Mackin, representing the Skaneateles Volunteer Fire Department; Vince Bruni, drill instructor for the corps; and Dave DeLorenzo, representing The Citizen-Advertiser.

Mrs. Riffe, president of the Social Club, made presentations to several corps members and Mrs. Frances Andrews, outgoing president of the Social Club. However, the biggest presentation was made by Mrs. Riffe to Nate Morabito, treasurer of the corps, as a check of \$500 was turned over from the candy sale.

Mr. Aubin, who has been the driving force behind the junior drum corps program, told the group that things have never looked better because of the cooperation being received from interested individuals coming forward to help on the many jobs required within a drum corps.

Mr. Aubin said this type of hard work is what makes a good corps a great one.

"We have gone farther in the past season than in the previous years," the corps chairman said. "The accomplishments are fabulous and much of this must be traced to the co-operation between the children and the adults."

Mr. Bruni, who is one of the most renowned men in the drum corps world as he provides drills for corps throughout the country, said he was extremely pleased to be associated with the Purple Lancers. He said the organization, those that work behind the scenes, impressed him very much and this was what makes the corps keep going when many are falling by the wayside.

"The drums are very few adults who will take the time and take interest in kids other than their own," he said, "but here you have many."

Then talking directly to the Lancers, he said that it doesn't matter how good the instruction is, the participants must show interest and give something extra. He warned them that the coming year will be very difficult as the corps improves and in doing so, it becomes tougher to improve the score.

"My biggest concern is that you had so much success in one year that you might lose drive," he continued. "You have made gigantic strides but you will be in for more detailed work before the summer."

The director also advised the parents and the corps members to keep working with the Cadets because their are a "tremendous asset" to the drum corps program.
