

103 area students win Regents scholarships

Students from Auburn and the Port Byron part of Cayuga County received the list of 103 county winners of 1970 Regents College Scholarships announced today by the State Education Department. In addition there were 11 winners from Skaneateles Central School and four alternates.

The high scorers in Cayuga County were Richard R. Walker of Central High School with a score of 264. Runner-up was Patrick J. Leary of Port Byron, a Port Byron Central School student, who had a 261 total.

Third place went to William E. Kohn, of 185 South St. Weedsport, a Weedsport Central student, who had 260. Next came Donald R. Dawson of Old State Road, Cato, a student at Red Creek Central in Wayne County, with a 257 score. Another point behind was Amy R. Levek of 265 F. Genesee St., a student at East High School.

In all, East High School had 22 winners and six alternates; Mount Carmel 17 winners and four alternates; West High seven winners and five alternates; Central High seven winners and two alternates.

Port Byron led the county schools with 13 winners and four alternates followed by Southern Cayuga with nine winners and one alternate. Weedsport with six winners and four alternates, Cato-Meridian with five winners and no alternates. Moravia with two winners and five alternates and Union Springs with two winners and two alternates.

Five area students win scholarships for nursing career

Two area boys and three girls won Regents scholarships for nursing careers, it was announced today by the State Education Department.

Winners were Raymond W. Drake and Lawrence M. Morabito, students at Mount Carmel; Gail P. Zilum of West High; Susan A. Namisniak, Port Byron Central and June E. Lear of Skaneateles Central School.

They are among 600 students in the state eligible for nursing career scholarships after taking a six-hour test measuring high school achievement and general academic ability on Oct. 8.

Awards range from \$200 to \$5,000 a year for up to five years, depending on family income. Students must study at a college or hospital school of nursing in New York State.

Scholarship winners also may receive scholar incentive aid of up to \$600 a year.

In the event that a scholar winner declines the award or is unable to accept it, the scholarship is offered to the highest ranking alternate in each county.

Trees on agenda

While much of the Auburn City Council agenda for Thursday deals with resolutions involving the tree removal contract, action may be put off a week to prevent a recurrence of last year's situation.

If memories are short — Quinlan Tree Service, the low bidder, was awarded the contract to remove 444 diseased elm trees at a cost of \$51,700. At the time the council also had to approve a bond anticipation note for \$33,700 because only \$18,000 was in the budget for tree removal.

However, nothing but problems cropped up. The firm could not handle all the work, and submit some of it to other firms. Property damage occurred. The project was not completed, and the contract was subject to several discussions.

At present, the situation is in the hands of the bonding company who hired Quinlan to finish the contract work.

To avoid a repeat performance, the council split the contract for the 1969-70 fiscal year into two parts — one for removal of 251 trees and the other for removal of 243 trees.

Bids were opened Tuesday and the Donovan Tree Service of Mechanicsville was low bidder on both parts of the contract, \$28,415 for the first part and \$35,440 for the second portion and an alternate of \$31,525.

The awarding of the contract and approval of another bond anticipation note is on the agenda for Thursday, but some members may want a more thorough investigation of the firms involved in the bidding.

A determination if Donovan is capable of doing all of the work within the specified time or even part of it, will be demanded by the council. Perhaps they will want to split the contracts just to assure completion of the work.

The city raised the budget for tree removal to only \$20,000 so another bond anticipation note must be floated to pay the additional cost.

In other action, the council is expected to give City Manager Bruce L. Clifford permission to file a letter of intent with the Department of Housing and Urban Development for a 50 per cent grant under the new Parks and Cities Program. This would split the cost of improvements for small parks equally between the city and the federal government.

It is not known if the Casey Park improvements will be covered under this program because of the size. However, the city is going to try to have some of this work placed in an application.

In executive session, the council also will review the 1970 recreation budget. This is necessary now because of the difference between the city and state fiscal years. The recreation budget must be submitted to obtain state aid for the program.

The renewal of the contract between the city and the Auburn Community Owned Non-Profit Baseball Club also will be discussed behind closed doors.

Maryland couple buy Skaneateles Press

The 130-year-old Skaneateles Press and the 90-year-old Marcellus Observer, were sold Monday by Dr. Wesley C. Clark, dean of Syracuse University School of Journalism to a Bethesda, Md., couple.

Mr. and Mrs. J. Lee Wood, now of 109 E. Genesee St., Skaneateles, purchased the two papers from Dean Clark for \$60,000.

Mr. Wood, who has assumed the duties as publisher and executive editor, announced the sale today.

He said, "Dr. Wesley C. Clark, dean of the Syracuse University School of Journalism and publisher of the Skaneateles Press and the Marcellus Observer, has sold the papers to Mr. and Mrs. J. Lee Wood of Bethesda, Md."

Dean Clark has been publisher of the 130-year-old Skaneateles Press since 1963 and the 90-year-old Marcellus Observer, since 1965.

His wife, the late Frances S. Clark, was editor of the papers until her death in September of this year.

Purchase of the papers was consummated on Dec. 15 with Allen J. Starnes acting as attorney for the Woods.

Mr. Woods said this week's edition of both papers will be the last under Dean Clark's supervision and the Christmas week editions to be published Dec. 23, will be the first under the new ownership.

Mr. Wood is a native of Fort Dodge, Iowa, and a veteran of four years' service in the Air Force.

He is a 1966 graduate of the Maryland University School of Journalism and he received his Master's in Journalism from American University in Washington, D.C., in 1967.

He was formerly employed with the National Geographic Magazine in Washington, D.C., and was press secretary for Rep. Larry Winn Jr. (R-Kan.).

ATL Stephen Louis Warner, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles R. Warner Sr. of 40 1/2 Nelson St., was killed early Sunday morning in a triple-traffic accident about three miles south of Patuxent River Naval Air Station, Md., where he was stationed.

An Aurora man, reportedly dependent over poor health, shot and killed himself Tuesday in his Main Street home.

State Police who investigated the incident reported that Oliver Carleton Weber, 45, father of three children, was found dead at 8:45 p.m. in a utility room at his home.

Acting Coroner Roy W. Kilburn ruled that the death was a suicide due to a self-inflicted gunshot wound. Dr. Louis D. Burlington pronounced Mr. Weber dead at the scene.

Troopers said that a .44 caliber revolver was used. No autopsy was performed.

State Police investigator Jon Washburn and Troopers C. J. Cornell and E. W. Stoker investigated the suicide.

Auburn Memorial Hospital authorities reported today that Mr. Weber had been treated for a cut upper lip suffered in an auto accident earlier in the day and released.

According to a report by Deputy George Southworth Mr. Weber was driving a pickup truck on Britt Road in Leyard when the vehicle went off the shoulder of the road and struck a tree. Mr. Weber was taken to Auburn Memorial Hospital by the Poplar Ridge ambulance.

Mr. Weber was a former operator of the Aurora Service Station and had been a taxi and bus driver for Wells College for many years. He later operated a distributing service for the Syracuse Herald-Journal.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Frances Marshall Weber; three children, Sally of Ithaca and Jimmy and Carol at home, and his parents, Prof. and Mrs. Christian Weber of Aurora.

Mr. Weber was a member of St. Paul's Episcopal Church of Aurora.
